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REPTILE IN KKW



Left picture:

(Top) Mangrove Skink (*Emoia atrocostata*) a very common reptile that can be seen here in KKW. It feed mainly insect and small invertebrates.

(Middle) Water Monitor Lizard (*Varanus salvator*) Not very common but often seen by visitors due to food source and prey for them in KKW. This large reptile always seen in the main waterways of KKW (river) lurking for prey.

(Bottom) Dog-faced snake (*Cerberus rynchops*) An aquatic and nocturnal snake rear fanged also a mildly venomous. It feeds mainly on fish. This snake rarity in KKW are normal. It often has been spotted in the shallow water and on the mud when the tide are low.



Right Picture:

(Top) Tree snake, a very illusive reptile that feeds on small lizards, birds and rodents.

(Middle) A rare horned flying lizard (Draco Cornutus) that roams from tree to tree hunting for insects. Often spotted in the entrance to KKW Mangrove forest.

(Bottom) A beautiful Reticulated python (*Python reticulatus*). One does not simply saw this creature in the mangrove forest of KKW but there are people who are lucky enough to see them.
